Making a romantic Valentine's Day breakfast

Many nutritional experts assert that breakfast is the most important meal of the day. It provides early energy and satisfies the hunger that is built up during the nighttime sleep hours.

Throughout the ages, breakfast has been the foundation of tradition in the military, whether cooked over a campfire or in a mess hall. Armies are said to "travel on their stomachs." For sailors breakfast is a test of the body's tolerance for a stormy day at sea. The Navy has traditionally added fish and other seafood to the menu.

A simple breakfast casserole can be a meal in itself or the center of a larger morning feast. It furnishes an abundance of protein, dairy products and cereal needs in the form of bread.

The foundation of this casserole is eggs, milk and cheese, but it can be enhanced by any other ingredient that might be included in an omelet.

On Valentine's Day, why not make it as a special breakfast in bed for your significant other?



Simple Breakfast Casserole

INGREDIENTS:

- 4 slices of bread, crusts trimmed
- 3 large eggs
- One 8-ounce package of shredded sharp cheddar cheese or other favorite cheese

(Gouda or Edam make this dish elegantly richer.)

- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper

Optional ingredients can be bacon, peppers, onions, mushrooms, ham, sausage, tomatoes or bacon bits.

Whisk eggs, milk, salt, pepper and any other optional ingredients together in a large mixing bowl. Trim the bread of crusts. Pour the mixture into a large casserole dish. Float the bread on the liquid and cover it with the shredded cheese.

Bake at 350 degrees until top of casserole starts to turn brown and mixture begins to firm. Serves four.

The casserole can be prepared ahead and reheated in the microwave. It is great the second or third day.

Update on the Social Security Fairness Act

Information Directly from Social Security Website

WHAT IS THE SOCIAL SECURITY FAIRNESS ACT (ACT) AND WHO DOES IT HELP?

The Act was signed into law on January 5, 2025.

The Act ends the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and Government Pension Offset (GPO). These provisions reduced or eliminated the Social Security benefits of over 3.2 million people who receive a pension based on work that was not covered by Social Security (a “non-covered pension”) because they did not pay Social Security taxes. This law increases Social Security benefits for certain types of workers, including some:

- teachers, firefighters, and police officers in many states;
- federal employees covered by the Civil Service Retirement System; and
- people whose work had been covered by a foreign social security system.

WILL EVERY TEACHER, FIREFIGHTER, POLICE OFFICER, OR PUBLIC WORKER RECEIVE A BENEFIT INCREASE BECAUSE OF THE NEW LAW?

• Not necessarily. We know that some press articles have mentioned teachers, firefighters, police officers, and other public employees when discussing the new law. However, only people who receive a pension based on work not covered by Social Security may see benefit increases.



Most state and local public employees—about 72 percent—work in Social Security-covered employment where they pay Social Security taxes and are not affected by WEP or GPO. Those individuals will not receive a benefit increase due to the new law.

WHEN WILL A PERSON SEE THEIR SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFIT INCREASE BECAUSE OF THE SOCIAL SECURITY FAIRNESS ACT?

• SSA is finalizing its plan to implement the Act. We cannot yet provide an estimated timeframe for when we will adjust a person’s past or future benefits, but we will continue to provide updates on this webpage. We thank the public for its patience.

FOR SOMEONE ALREADY RECEIVING BENEFITS AFFECTED BY WEP OR GPO, HOW FAR BACK MIGHT THEY RECEIVE INCREASED BENEFITS UNDER THE SOCIAL SECURITY FAIRNESS ACT?

• December 2023 is the last month that WEP and GPO will apply. This means that those rules no longer apply to benefits payable for January 2024 and later. Important Reminder: Social Security benefits payable for January 2024 would generally have been received in February 2024.

WHAT SHOULD PEOPLE DO NOW THAT THE SOCIAL SECURITY FAIRNESS ACT IS LAW?

• The Act applies to benefits you get on your own record (retirement or disability benefits) and to spouse’s or surviving spouse’s benefits on another person’s record. What action you need to take depends on your situation and on what type of benefits you qualify for.

• **If you never applied for retirement, spouse’s, or surviving spouse’s benefits because of WEP or GPO:**

• You may need to file an application. The date of your application might affect when your benefits begin and your benefit amount. However, each case is different, and all other Social Security laws and policies, such as benefit reductions for claiming benefits before the full retirement age, the retirement earnings test, and others, still apply.

Travel Back in Time by Visiting These Living History Museums

These six sites recreate historical communities

Our family loves visiting Plimoth Patuxet Museums in Massachusetts because each trip offers a unique experience. Why does it always feel new? It's partly because it's a living history museum that recreates historical communities, with actors portraying real people from that time period. My husband enjoys trying to get the actors to "break character" but so far he hasn't succeeded.

The 2023 U.S. Family Travel Survey found that people who went on skip-generational trips, traveling with grandparents and grandchild, preferred visiting museums and cultural attractions. Here are some living history museums you can visit in the U.S.

Plimoth Patuxet Museums

LOCATION: Plymouth, Massachusetts

ADMISSION: \$35 for adults, \$31.50 for adults 65-plus

OFFERINGS: Plimoth Patuxet spans more than 30 acres and features four distinct settings, all based on early 17th-century New England, approximately seven years after the Pilgrims arrived. The main campus is a recreation of an English village on one side and a Native American

Wampanoag community on the other. "We teach history by recreating immersive historical environments," says Malka Benjamin, the director of colonial inter-

pretation and training. Interpreters acting and dressed like a Pilgrim can be found in the English village.

Whereas the Native American community is comprised of people who are Wampanoag or members of other Indigenous tribes who aren't acting. The other two campuses located about 2.5 miles from the main campus, in downtown Plymouth, are the Plimoth Grist Mill and the Mayflower II. "A lot of folks think that the museum is really just for kids, and I would say that's a really big misconception," Benjamin says.

SPECIAL EVENTS: Fall Harvest Dinners and Thanksgiving Day Buffet. Offered in October and November, visitors can experience what it was like to dine in the 1600s, featuring authentic recipes from the era and interpreters serving the meal. "The oldest recipe that we serve is from the first-known collected English cookbook from 1390 which is called, *The Forme of Cury*," Benjamin says. The Thanksgiving buffet is only served on Thanksgiving Day. Tickets go on sale in June and sometimes sell out.

Mystic Seaport Museum

LOCATION: Mystic, Connecticut

ADMISSION: \$31 for adults, \$29 for adults 65-plus

OFFERINGS: Mystic Seaport is a recreation of a New England coastal village based in the 19th century including a working shipyard and 500 ships. Even though it's a recreation some of the homes are historic.

"A few of the houses were moved from other parts of [New England] to our village," says Amanda Furlong, the marketing and communications manager. In the village, interpreters dressed as people from the 1800s bring history to life. Many are skilled in trades such as cooperage, printing, cooking, and other crafts. Guests can watch while interpreters cook meals, Furlong says.

SPECIAL EVENTS: WoodenBoat Show. In June, visitors can learn how to build boats and see more than 100 wooden boats such as kayaks, day-sailers and schooners.

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Living History Museums

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Colonial Williamsburg Museum

LOCATION: Williamsburg, Virginia

ADMISSION: \$31.50 adult single-day pass (online)

OFFERINGS: “Colonial Williamsburg is often called the largest living history museum in the nation,” says Ellen Peltz, the public relations manager. She explains that this distinction is based on the property’s 301 acres and the extensive size of its historic collections. The village features 89 original buildings and 500 reconstructed ones, all designed to reflect the late 18th century. “It’s an entire city,” Peltz says. “We have people who are doing first-person interpretation.” Peltz explains that the community includes

well-known figures such as Thomas Jefferson, as well as other individuals such as women, enslaved people, and Indigenous people. “We’re really committed to telling a full story,” she says.

SPECIAL EVENTS: July 4 Celebration. Programming throughout the day ends with a fireworks display, Peltz says. She adds that free admission to the historic area and art museums has been offered during this event.

Old World Wisconsin

LOCATION: Eagle, Wisconsin

ADMISSION: \$20 for adults, \$18 for adults 65-plus

OFFERINGS: The community focus of Old World Wisconsin is on European immigrants and migrants coming from other parts of the United States who lived in a rural Wisconsin village

between the 1840s and 1930s, says Maria Comiskey, the general manager of experiences and events. At the 600-acre site, you can watch interpreters demonstrating crafts and trades or explore several different farms.

SPECIAL EVENTS: Midsummer Celebration. The June event, which Comiskey says is a Scandinavian celebration, marks the longest day of the year. During the celebration, people spend time outdoors, connect with nature, and enjoy festivities, she says.

El Rancho de Las Golondrinas (“The Ranch of the Swallows”)

LOCATION: Santa Fe, New Mexico

ADMISSION: \$8 for adults, \$6 for adults 62-plus

OFFERINGS: “Our focus is on the Spanish, Mexican and territorial periods in New Mexico,” says Daniel Goodman, the museum director. He explains that the ranch, which is 500 acres with 34 historic buildings and 10 modern museum structures, covers from the 1700s up until statehood. Dressed in traditional clothing of the time, volunteers help visitors understand how to run a grist mill or be a blacksmith. There are hands-on activities so visitors can learn about the culture and history, Goodman says.

SPECIAL EVENTS: Santa Fe Harvest

Festival. Voted the second-best harvest festival in the country by *USA Today*, this event invites visitors to stomp grapes for winemaking or crush apples to create cider.

Conner Prairie

LOCATION: Fishers, Indiana

ADMISSION: \$25 for adults, \$23 for adults 65-plus

OFFERINGS: Visitors can explore historic sites across 1,000 acres, including the 1816 Lenape Indian Camp, Prairietown, and the 1859 Balloon Voyage. At the 1816 Lenape Indian Camp, visitors can learn about the culture and relationships between the Lenape people and American fur traders. Prairietown, an outdoor 19th-century village, offers immersive experiences. “You can study in the one-room schoolhouse, help with

chores, or watch a tradesperson at work,” says Hyacinth Rucker, senior manager of public relations and communications. In the Balloon Voyage area, Rucker explains that the helium balloon pays tribute to the Jupiter, a balloon designed and piloted by John Wise, marking the first successful airmail delivery in the United States. Visitors can also ride the balloon for an additional fee.

SPECIAL EVENTS: Jupiter Flights Balloon Festival. In September, visitors can

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Try Dublin Coddle for a traditional St. Patrick's Day dish

Dublin Coddle has a rich history deeply embedded in the culture of Dublin, Ireland, dating back to at least the 18th century, with some sources suggesting origins during the first Irish famine in the late 1700s.



The name "Coddle" is believed to derive from the French term "caudle," which means to boil gently or to stew. This reflects the method of cooking where ingredients are slowly simmered together.

Known as a dish for the working class, Coddle was particularly popular among Dubliners for its simplicity, affordability, and the ability to cook it over a long period without much attention. It's a comforting, hearty dish.

INGREDIENTS:

1 lb pork sausages (Irish bangers if you can find them, otherwise any good quality sausage will do)

1 lb bacon, preferably thick-cut or Irish bacon, cut into pieces

4 large potatoes, peeled and thickly sliced

2 large onions, sliced

1 3/4 cups chicken or beef stock (or water)

2-3 cloves of garlic, minced (optional, traditionalists might skip this)

Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste

Optional: 1-2 carrots, sliced (less traditional but adds color and sweetness)

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Preheat your oven to 350 degrees.

2. Prepare the bacon and sausages, cooking over medium heat until they start to brown and release some fat. Brown the sausages, but don't cook through, in the same pan.

3. Layer the Ingredients in a large oven-proof casserole dish or Dutch oven. At the bottom, place potatoes followed by layers of onions, then half of the bacon, then sausages. Continue layering until the ingredients are gone. Add the optional carrots on top. Season each layer.

4. Pour the stock (or water) over everything. It should come up to about three-quarters of the height of the layers. You want to ensure everything is moist but not swimming in liquid.

5. Cover with a lid or foil and bake in the oven for about 1 hour.

After an hour, check the potatoes; they should be nearly tender.

6. Once the potatoes are tender and the top has a nice color, remove from the oven.

7. Serve this hearty dish with a pint of Guinness or a glass of Irish whiskey for an authentic St. Patrick's Day.
