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REAOC Supplemental Plans – Open Enrollment

All retirees should receive their 2023 REAOC Supplemental Benefits Guide offered through PGA by the middle of October. This guide details the benefit plans offered exclusively to REAOC members. Plans include two high benefit dental plans (PPO & HMO), a vision plan, legal services, identity theft protection, pet care, travel protection, life insurance, personal accident coverage, and more.

Starting in 2023, the Cigna HMO dental plan will have an expanded dental network that includes an additional 800 dental facilities in California. The vision plan will have some enhancements.

This is your once-a-year chance to change dental plans or to enroll in the supplemental benefits offered. The Benefit Guides are mailed to the address OCERS (not REAOC) has on file, so if you have moved, please make sure they have your current address. Not only does the guide list all the plans available, but they also show any benefit or rate changes.

If you are NOT making changes to your coverages, you do NOT need to return the Enrollment Form. Your enrolled coverages will continue for 2023. If you do plan on making changes or enrolling for the first time, we need your enrollment form back no later than November 11th.

Supervisors adopted the 2023 County retiree insurance plans and new 2023 insurance rates. Rates vary by plan, some with double-digit increases, some with double digit decreases; some with moderate or minimal change. Please review all available plans and the new 2023 rates. **Urgent Message:** If you are both: 1) enrolled in a County-sponsored insurance plan and 2) you and/or your dependent is PRE-65 and non-Medicare eligible, it is extremely important you carefully review all insurance options available. Insurance increases in the County-funded Sharewell or Wellwise plans can be as high as 25 to 50% of the rates you are currently paying; this increase is due to increased medical and prescription experience for the past usage period. Sticker

shock may be in-store for a number of retirees. Alternative PPO and HMO plans for PRE-65 retirees may have a less financial impact on retirement budgets. The newly adopted 2023 rates are posted on the REAOC website at www.reaoc.org. **Note:** While REAOC is NOT invited nor included in rate setting or plan document negotiations, REAOC representatives continue to meet with Human Resources/Employee Benefits staff to voice concerns and/or provide input for CEO and Board of Supervisor consideration.

To accommodate as many retirees as possible, a 2023 Open Enrollment presentation will be held at the County's new County Administration South, conference center (CAS) building on Thursday,

The mission of REAOC is to promote and maintain fellowship and camaraderie of OCERS retirees and their spouses by sponsoring social and recreational activities and by maintaining contacts via the newsletter, the REAOC website, e-mail, or other means of communication. CalPERS Long-Term Care Insurance Class Action Settlement Negotiations Continue on a Difficult Path

Many of you will recall that a settlement agreement in the complicated and difficult class action against CalPERS was entered into in early 2021. Under the agreement, members of the class could elect to receive a refund of all premiums previously paid in exchange for cancelling their policies. CalPERS retained the right to cancel the agreement if more than 10% of class members opted out of

the agreement.

CalPERS exercised its cancellation rights on April 20, 2022, after roughly 30% of the class members opted out of the settlement agreement. Since then, the attorneys for class members and CalPERS have continued with negotiations, hoping to reach a new settlement.

Meanwhile, steps to bring the case to trial continue. The court held a trial setting conference on June 15,

2022.

Although the matter is now reset for trial, the parties are still engaged in mediation in hopes to agree on a restructured proposed settlement for the court's consideration.

Scholarships of \$2,000 were awarded on the basis of academic performance and achievements, community service and honors. The process requires that all identifying information be removed before the committee members receive the applications for review. The Scholarship Committee members do not know the names of any of the recipients until after the selection process is fully completed. The

Open Enrollment will be from Wednesday, October 19, to Tuesday, November 8, 2021. Elections made during Open Enrollment are effective January 1, 2023. Mark your calendars with the important dates below.

What Is In It For You?

With everyday life and the constant change and increases we see for just about everything—now is the time to make sure you have the right coverage for you and your family. We strongly encourage you to take advantage of the tools and resources made available to you before and during Open Enrollment.

Open Enrollment Retiree Solicitation – New for this year:

The Benefits Service Center will be mailing to your home address the following communication to help prepare you for the upcoming 2023 Open Enrollment. You will receive an Open Enrollment Solicitation that will contain:

- Open Enrollment letter;
- Confirmation of Benefits (that will display your 2023 Grant, if eligible);
- the 2023 retiree rates.

This will allow you the opportunity to decide if you are enrolled in the right health plan. This new communication will take the place of the Pre-Open Enrollment and Open Enrollment solicitations that are usually sent to notify retirees of the Open Enrollment period.

On October 12, you can access essential benefits information at the Benefits Service Center website by clicking the tile “Open Enrollment begins Wednesday, October 19, 2022, Prepare Now.” This tile allows

Thursday, **October 27**, join us for an in-person **Open Enrollment presentation**. REAOC, Employee Benefits and all the health plan providers will share resources and give you an opportunity to ask your questions and get answers. The Open Enrollment presentation will be held at 10:00 am. If you are unable to attend in person, we will post the recorded presentation on the Employee benefits website at, <https://hrs.ocgov.com/employeebenefits>, click on “Open Enrollment.” **Manage Your Communication Preferences Right Away So You Get All The Important information –**

Take a moment to verify your setting on your communications preferences on the Benefits Center website, **My OC Benefits™** or the Aight Mobile app. Remember, you

can be notified by email or postal mail to your home address.

You can also obtain information online at mybenefits.ocgov.com by asking Lisa, a virtual online resource. Lisa can answer most frequently asked questions. You can also start a “Web Chat” with a representative to ask your questions and get answers. You can set a scheduled appointment to speak to a representative one on one when it is convenient for you. Appointment availability is limited and available on a first come first served basis.

If you are eligible for the monthly Medicare Part B Reimbursement for 2023, you will receive the lesser of \$104.90, your monthly Grant amount or your actual Medicare premium cost per month. Each year we ask that you provide a copy of the upcoming plan year Medicare premium statement to the Benefits Service Center. If your submitted documentation verifying the new Medicare Part B premium is received on or before December 31, 2022, your Part B
